U.S. DEPARTMENT OF THE TREASURY



The American Rescue Plan will deliver \$350 billion for state, local, territorial, and Tribal governments to respond to the COVID-19 emergency and bring back jobs.



ARPA Background

State and Local Fiscal Recovery Fund (SLFRF) - \$164M

- Direct funding to County
 - First \$82M payment received June 2021
 - Second \$82M payment anticipated Summer 2022
- Obligate by Dec 31, 2024; Spend by Dec 31, 2026
- Respond to social & economic impacts from COVID-19
- Focus on disadvantaged communities & equitable recovery
- Approx. \$140M in direct funding to cities & \$160M to schools in the County
- BOS Updates Oct 5, 2021 & Nov 16, 2021

Accomplishments & Updates

- Board Approved Projects \$5.7M
 - Piru Wastewater Treatment Plant | Mesa Transitional Housing | MBCRG Administration
- Direct engagement with Community Based Organizations
 - Ventura County Economic Development Collaborative (EDC)
 - First 5 Ventura County (F5VC)
 - Ventura County Taxpayers Association (VCTA)
 - Ventura County Community Foundation (VCCF) hosted call with 49 CBOs
 - Ventura County Economic Vitality Strategic Plan (EVSP) Committee with 21 CBOs including cities
- Issued a "Call for Projects" for County agencies
- Established the SLFRF Advisory Team to assist the CEO with ARPA process
- Launched the County's ARPA Website & Public Survey
 - Digital and physical materials available in both English and Spanish
 - 254 total surveys completed, 63 from CBOs, as of Apr 21, 2022
 - ARPA info sent to 140,000+ community members in English and Spanish in County e-newsletter
- Dept of Treasury Updates
 - Final Rule released Jan 6, 2022
 - Updated Compliance & Reporting Guidance Feb 28, 2022
 - Required quarterly ARPA reports to Treasury submitted on time
- Continuing to identify potential opportunities
- Coordination, oversight, and management of the SLFRF award by the CEO

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The American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), signed into law in March 2021, is a federally approved stimulus plan that provides \$350 billion of stimulus funding to State and Local Governments out of the \$1.9 trillion-dollar bill. It supports an equitable economic recovery from the economic impacts caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. The share expected to be received by the County of Ventura is approximately \$164.3 million.
