

Thomas Fire Recovery 777 Residences

- 59 Residential Building Permit Applications Received (out of 245 residences destroyed in the unincorporated county)
- 667 Properties Cleared of Fire Debris
- 33 Residential Building Permits Issued

Rise Program

Encourages and enables people to get assessment and treatment.

Field-based team makes contact
