"The Camarillo Health Care District (CHCD)...provides services and

program for residents 60 years of age and older."

DISAGREE:

The CHCD disagrees with this fact as the CHCD provides a broad

variety of direct client services for clients of all ages.

FA-04:

"... It provides a variety of service to seniors and their caregivers

including..."

DISAGREE:

The CHCD disagrees with this fact as the CHCD provides a broad

variety of direct client services for clients of all ages.

FA-07:

"The City of Camarillo has no formal relationship with the CHCD and

the PVRPD"

DISAGREE:

The CHCD disagrees with this fact as the City of Camarillo and the

CHCD have a long-standing, formal agreement to support partial

funding of the Senior Nutrition Program.

FA-11:

"From 2005-2012, the CHCD and PVRPD had a Memorandum of Understanding for serving a congregate meal to seniors four days a

week. The CHCD provided staff and services; the PVRPD provided

facilities"

DISAGREE:

The CHCD disagrees with this fact as the CHCD and the PVRPD

continue to collaborate and cooperate under formal Memorandum of

Understanding for facility use in the Senior Nutrition Program.

FINDINGS

I (We) disagree wholly or partially with the findings numbered: FI-01, FI-02, FI-03, FI-04, FI-05
 (Attach a statement specifying any portions of the findings that are disputed; include an explanation of the reasons therefor.)

FI-01:

"Seniors in the Camarillo area have less access to congregate meals than

those in other areas of the County"

DISAGREE:

The CHCD disagrees with this finding as, in addition to the supplemental

Senior Nutrition Programs (home-delivered and congregate) offered by the

CHCD, additional congregate or community meal/pantry opportunities are available Monday through Friday at a variety of locations. (ATTACHMENT A)

FI-02:

(A) "The CHCD receives less of the available public funding for the congregate program than other service providers in the County. (B) It only applies for funding to cover the costs of a once-a-month congregate meal"

DISAGREE:

The CHCD disagrees with this finding as follows:

- (A) The CHCD applies to the VCAAA for Title IIIC (c-1, c-2) federal funding of the Senior Nutrition Program. The CHCD is unaware of additional public entities acting as fiduciary agents to provide Title IIIC funding support for the Senior Nutrition Program.
- (B) The CHCD conducts the congregate meal program once a month as home-delivered meals continue to be the majority need in the Camarillo service area. As defined by the Title IIIC funding guidelines, home-bound residents are assessed as unable to procure or prepare food on their own; 97% of all Senior Nutrition Program meals served by the CHCD are home-delivered meals. A variety of food sites and food opportunities remain available for mobile residents to receive supplemental nutrition. (ATTACHMENT A)

FI-03:

DISAGREE:

"The senior population of Camarillo has not been formally surveyed to determine its need for a five-day-a week congregate meal program". The CHCD disagrees with this finding, as the Ventura County Area Agency on Aging recently completed a Master Strategic Plan 2016-2020, addressing this issue with the following results:

- Consumers Group: rated "Access to nutritious food; nutrition education and counseling" as 2nd priority (ATTACHMENT B)
- Professionals Group: rated "Access to nutritious food; nutrition education and counseling" as 9th priority (ATTACHMENT B)
- When asked "In the next 10 years, what do you think the THREE (3) MOST IMPORTANT services will be for Ventura County seniors and persons with disabilities?" the response as recorded in the VCAAA Community Snapshot rated "homedelivered meals" as 3rd priority out of 21. (ATTACHMENT C)
- When asked "How important are the following items to help keep you where you are right now, that is, to help you maintain your current lifestyle", the response as recorded in the VCAAA Community Snapshot rated "having a meal with my friends or others like me" as 8th priority out of 22; and rated "information on how to eat healthy" as 15th priority out of 22. (ATTACHMENT D)

FI-04:

"The City of Camarillo allocates limited General Fund support for senior programs when compared with other cities in the County."

DISAGREE:

This finding is not fact-specific to the CHCD.

FI-05:

"The City of Camarillo, the Camarillo Health Care District, and the Pleasant Valley Recreation and Park District have not adequately collaborated or coordinated efforts to meet the needs of seniors in Camarillo."

DISAGREE:

The CHCD disagrees with this finding, as through the years, the CHCD has enjoyed a long history of collaborative and/or coordinated efforts with both entities. The following abbreviated list describes some of those efforts, both current and past:

- Both the Camarillo City Manager and the PVRPD District General Manager are members of the District's Community Advisory Panel "designed to... offer their invaluable perspective and guidance in meeting the needs of the community"
- PVRPD District General Manager and District CEO meet monthly
- Camarillo City Council continues to allocate funding to the Senior Nutrition Program (since 2006/07)
- The CHCD and the PVRPD continue under formal MOU for facility use in the Senior Nutrition Program
- CHCD currently serves as Chair of the City of Camarillo's Council on Aging (CCOA); CHCD Board President Chaired CCOA in the past; CHCD has been an active member of CCOA for at least the past ten years
- Representatives from each entity are included as CCOA agenda items and present updates of interest to the CCOA Board
- The CHCD has hosted CCOA meetings and county-wide CCOA meetings

RECOMMENDATIONS

 Recommendations numbered <u>R-01, R-02</u> will not be implemented because they are not warranted or are not reasonable. (Attach an explanation.)

R-01:

"The Grand Jury recommends that the Camarillo City Council, in conjunction with the Camarillo Council on Aging, conduct a comprehensive formal "needs survey" to determine senior concerns, especially as related to an expanded congregate meal program"(FI-01, 02, 03, 04, 05)

NOT WARRANTED:

As discussed in FI-O3, a recent, comprehensive, formal study (*Ventura County Area Agency on Aging Master Strategic Plan 2016-2020*) has been conducted, with results regarding meals, nutrition, and access to nutrition education, as follows:

- Consumers Group: rated "Access to nutritious food; nutrition education and counseling" as 2nd priority (ATTACHMENT B)
- Professionals Group: rated "Access to nutritious food; nutrition education and counseling" as 9th priority (ATTACHMENT B)
- When asked "In the next 10 years, what do you think the THREE (3) MOST IMPORTANT services will be for Ventura County seniors and persons with disabilities?" the recorded response in the VCAAA Community Snapshot rated "home-

- delivered meals" as 3rd priority out of 21. (ATTACHMENT C)
- When asked "How important are the following items to help keep you where you are right now, that is, to help you maintain your current lifestyle", the recorded response in the VCAAA Community Snapshot rated "having a meal with my friends or others like me" as 8th priority out of 22; and rated "information on how to eat healthy" as 15th priority out of 22. (ATTACHMENT D)

R-02:

"The Grand Jury recommends that the Camarillo City Council, the Board of Directors of the Camarillo Health Care District, and the Board of Directors of the Pleasant Valley Recreation and Park District establish formal and regular communication in order to formulate goals and coordinate resources to meet the needs of the senior population." FI-05

NOT WARRANTED:

The CHCD continues to enjoy a long history of collaborative and/or coordinated efforts with both the City of Camarillo and the Pleasant Valley Recreation and Park District. The CHCD remains an active community partner and is committed to evaluating emerging opportunities. Please refer to the response for FI-05.




Comparison of Needs Identified by Consumers Compared to Professionals

The survey sent to consumers and professionals asked to them to prioritize the current and projected needs of older adults and their unpaid, informal caregivers. For planning purposes, VCAAA will be focusing on the long-term projected needs (through 2030) expressed by the consumer responders. It is interesting to note the different priority of needs stated by the two groups, as shown in the table below. The most obvious explanation for the differences is the professionals are familiar with and work with individuals who have immediate need for services. In contrast, consumer responders may have no experience seeking assistance or services but can project those needs based upon their own experience. Priorities of both groups are important and will be considered in the planning process. That being stated, VCAAA is mandated to give priority to addressing the needs of the consumers.


